HRRP Media Digest, some major stories include:

NRA approves six new designs of low-cost housing: The NRA Executive Committee has approved six new low-cost housing designs. These designs were prepared by the Society of Nepali Architects and JICA, and HRRP and Build Change supported the NRA and MoUD CL-PIU with the structural review of the designs as part of the approval process.

<u>Centuries-old pati, hit by 2015 earthquake, reconstructed in Patan:</u> A 349-year-old pati (inn), Lunchhen Nani Phalcha in Chabahal, Tangal of Patan, destroyed by the Gorkha Earthquake 2015, has been handed over to the community after its reconstruction.

NRA tells govt to facilitate timber supply for reconstruction: The National Reconstruction Authority Chief Executive Officer Dr. Govinda Raj Pokharel has directed the government authorities to distribute timber at a subsidised price for the construction of houses in earthquake-affected districts.

Govt told to launch reconstruction fund within a month: The Development Committee of the Parliament on Wednesday told the concerned government bodies, including the National Reconstruction Authority, to set up a reconstruction fund within one month. Without this fund in place, the NRA must request the Ministry of Finance to release the reconstruction budget.

<u>NRA 5W Reporting:</u> to date only 79 out of 131 partners have reported to the NRA 5W system. We urge partners who have not reported to share their data as soon as possible. Meetings and Events

NRA Housing Technical Working Group: on Thursday 22 March, the technical working group met to work on preparing a scoring system for inspection and compliance. It is being proposed that houses would be initially evaluated to determine if they can be reviewed under the scoring system, if yes, houses will then be reviewed and if they meet a certain % they will be awarded the 2nd tranche but must make the corrections required to reach 100% before applying for the 3rd tranche. The NRA also presented retrofit options that have been developed using timber, iron rod, GI wire mesh and combinations of three. The Non-Resident Nepali (NRN) group presented their house design for their planned settlement work in Larpak, Gorkha. The NRN design had not incorporated earthquake forces in their structural calculations and the designs were rejected. Northern Areas Technical Session: tentatively scheduled for Monday 3rd April in DUDBC Conference Hall; keep an eye out for the invitation with all the details!

<u>Taking Action Based on Community Feedback:</u> first, of what will be regular meetings, focused on action planning to address reconstruction issues raised by communities took place on Wednesday 22 March. The summary of the meeting will be available soon. The actions recommended during the session included:

- 6-activity technical assistance package: communities going through the reconstruction process need to have
 access to continuous and targeted information throughout the process. TA needs to be comprehensive and
 needs to target various groups; households, masons, vendors and producers, community / political leaders,
 women, young people, etc.
- Vulnerable top-up grants: currently only planned for 535 households, POs requested to consider expanding coverage of the top-up grant to support vulnerable and remote households
- Design support: POs were requested to scale up support to communities for house design preparation either through door to door technical assistance teams or helpdesk / technical resource centres (coverage of helpdesks / resource centres is currently very poor, including a number of centres which do not cover full VDCs)
- Information on finance: scale up information to households on accessing additional finance for their reconstruction and on budgeting.

Sindhupalchowk Shelter Cluster Meeting, 22nd March: there were two agenda points; preparation for an earthquake drill that the Shelter Cluster is going to hold on 31st March with the DDRC, and housing reconstruction. The drill is intended to examine the current strengths and capacity of the clusters and DDRC, and identify areas for improvement. The DUDBC / DL-PIU Chief requested POs to support with preparation of a trained masons roster, including photos, which will be kept in an earthquake memorial museum planned for Chautara. DUDBC have found that coordination at field level between POs staff and the DL-PIU engineers is weak. The DUDBC Chief requested POs to collaborate with the DL-PIU engineers at field level and work as one team. The SABAL programme will be holding coordination meetings for VDC Secretaries, DL-PIU engineers, and POs at VDC cluster level soon. The next Shelter Cluster meeting will be held on Monday 27th at 2pm. Please contact Rup Kumar BC, HRRP District Coordinator in Sindhupalchowk, for more information.

<u>Demand and Supply of Construction Materials in Ramechhap District:</u> report prepared by the Nepal Agricultural Market Development Programme (NAMDP), on behalf of the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC, monitored the price of key construction materials in the district headquarters and three other key market centres in Ramechhap district. The assessment was carried out on a weekly basis from the first week of December 2016 for eight weeks.
